## New Version of Inputlog

There is a new version of Inputlog 5 available (version 5.0.24 dated February 2012). The main changes in this version are: guided installation procedure; a language component in the record-functionality to be used in the linguistic component that will be added later this year; product-process ratios in the summary analysis; more possibilities to filter your data (e.g. time filters); batch processing of the analyses; optimization of replay and S-Notation. ## COST: Training School in Potsdam (March)

The Training School "Multilevel Modelling in Eye-Tracking and Keystroke-Logging Research: Hands-on-Training" is to be held at the University of Potsdam (Germany) from March 28 to 31, 2012.

The Training School aims at providing intensive training on Multilevel Modelling using statistical software on datasets gained from combined Eye-Tracking and Keystroke-Logging experiments.

### COST: Training School in Poitiers (April)

The Training School “Mastering *Eye and Pen* software for studying handwriting in real time” is to be held at the laboratory CeRCA-CNRS in Poitiers (France) from April 10 to 12 2012; in collaboration with the MSHS-CNRS and the University of Poitiers.

The Training School aims at providing intensive training in the *Eye & Pen* software with practical experience. This software allows the study of handwriting in real time, combining eye and graphomotor movements recording.

### COST: Training School in Padua (April)

The Training School “Assessing in writing difficulties: methods, tools and measures for the analysis of the product and the process” is to be held at the Department of Developmental Psychology in Padova (Italy) from April 17 to 19, 2012. An International Day on Writing Research, in honor of Pietro Boscolo, will follow on April 20th. Attendance to the Writing Day will be free and will not require subscription fees.

The Training School aims at providing intensive training in the use of direct and indirect methods for the assessment of writing difficulties (related to poor writing, LI, deafness, dyslexia, and dysgraphia). The trainees will have the opportunity to analyze and discuss technics and methods in the measurement and analysis of the writing process and product of writers with writing difficulties. All the levels at which writing difficulties can be analyzed will be considered:

sublexical, lexical, sentence-level, and textual. The assessment of writing skills across genres and languages will be also discussed.

### Event: CL&W 2012



The “Second Workshop on Computational Linguistics and Writing (CL&W 2012): Linguistic and Cognitive Aspects of Document Creation and Document Engineering” will take place in Avignon (France) as co-located event of the “13<sup>th</sup> Conference of the European Chapter of the Association for computational Linguistics” on April 23, 2012.

The workshop aims to provide an overview of current developments in the area of computational linguistics for authoring aids, and an overview of recent advances in writing research. It brings together researchers from writing research and computational linguistics to stimulate discussion and cooperation between areas of research.
